

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY-GENERAL ON THE MEETING OF THE OAU DEFENCE COMMISSION

The Council of Ministers may recall that in its Thirty-First Ordinary Session in Khartoum last year, it considered the question of establishing an Inter-African Military Force of Intervention under the auspices of the OAU. The Council adopted Resolution CM/Res.635 (XXXI) in which the Council of Ministers:-

- 1) Reaffirmed that Africa's defence and security are the exclusive responsibility of the Africans;
- 2) declared that the creation of an Inter-African Force can be envisaged only within the context of OAU's objectives and priorities for the elemination of the racist minority regimes of Southern Africa, the total liberation of the Continent, and the safe-guarding of the independence, sovereignty and territorial integrity of Member States;
- 3) called for the reactivation of the OAU Defence Commission to consider the desirability of establishing an Inter-African Military Force under the aegis of the OAU;
- 2. In compliance with the decision of the Council of Ministers, the General Secretariat organized a meeting for the OAU Defence Commission which met in its Sixth Ordinary Session in Addis Ababa from April 21-25, 1979.

3. The following Member-States took part in the meeting of the Defence Commission:

Algeria, Angola, Burundi, Cameroun, Cape Verde, Congo, Ivory Coast, Djibouti, Egypt, Ethiopia, Gabon, Ghana, Guinea-Bissau, Guinea, Upper Volta, Kenya, Liberia, Libya, Mali, Morocco, Mozambique, Niger, Nigeria, Rwanda, Senegal, Sierra Leone, Sudan, Tanzania, Togo, Tunisia, Zaire and Zambia.

- 4. Representatives of the Patriotic Front, SWAPO and Pan-Africanist Congress of Azania also participated in the meeting as observers.
 - 5. At its Sixth Ordinary Session, the OAU Defence Commission considered:-
 - 1) The question of establishing an Inter-African Defence Force,
 - 2) The question of assistance to the Front-line States in line with Resolution AHG/80 (XIII) of the Assembly of Heads of State and Government.
- In its consideration of the question of establishing an Inter-African Defence Force, the Defence Commission unanimously agreed on the great need of setting-up an Inter-African Defence Force under the auspices of the Organization of African Unity. Towards that end, the Defence Commission decided that an Inter-African Military Force to be known as the "OAU Defence Force" should be set-up under the aegis of the OAU.

- The objective of the OAU Defence Force would be to support Member States in the event of aggression from outside the continent including aggression by the racist minority regimes of Southern Africa, to assist in the Liberation struggle being waged in the African territories still under colonial and racist domination and to provide peace keeping/observer forece in the event of conflict between Member States. The General Guidelines adopted by the Defence Commission DEF/GL(VI)Rev.2 are annexed to this report for the consideration of the Council of Ministers. The said General Guidelines inter alia, delineate very clearly the structure, mandate, and conditions of deployment of the proposed OAU Defence Force.
 - 8. The Ohu Defence Commission strongly recommended that the Thirty-Third Session of the Council of Ministers should adopt the recommendations of the Sixth Ordinary Session of the Defence Commission contained in document DEF/GL(IV) Rev. 2 which is appended to this report.
 - 9. On the question of assistance to Front-line States, the Defence Commission considered a list of military and material requirements submitted by the Front-line States. In its discussions of assistance to the Front-line States, the Defence Commission was of the common view that the decision of the July 1976 Summit in Maurituis should be implemented and that Member States should assist the Front-line States to strengthen their military capability vis-é-vis aggressions perpetrated by the racist minority regimes in Southern Africa against these countries. Assistance to Front-line States would also enable these countries to execute the Liberation struggle.

10. In consideration of the list of requirements of Frontline States, the Defence Commission has requested the General Secretariat to submit the list to the Council of Ministers in its 33rd Ordinary Session in Monrovia, Liberia. It is on the basis of this recommendation of the Defence Commission, that the General Secretariat is submitting the said list of requirements of Front-line States which is annexed to this report for the consideration of the Council. GENERAL GUIDELINES FOR THE SREATION OF AN OAU DEFENCE FORCE

<u>Preamble</u>

The OAU Defence Commission, meeting in its Sixth-Ordinary Session in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, from 21 to 26 April 1979,

Recalling Resolution CM/Res.635 (XXXI) by which the OAU Defence Commission has been requested to consider the desirability of establishing an Inter-African Military Force under the aegis of the OAU,

Bearing in mind the solemn declaration of the Council of Ministers that the creation of such a force can be envisaged only within the context of OAU's objectives and priorities for the elimination of the racist minority regimes in Southern Africa, the total liberation of the Continent and the safe guarding of the independence, sovereignty and territorial integrity of member States,

Having ascertained the desirability of establishing such a force, and

Conscious of the need to amend the OAU Charter to bring it in line with Articles 39 and 57 of Chapter VII of the United Nations' Charter,

DECIDES to recommend the following to the 33rd Ordinary Session of the Council of Ministers:

1. TO ESTABLISH an Inter-African Military Force under the aegis of the OAU to be known as the "OAU Defence Force".

2. Institutions of the Defence Force

(a) The supreme organ that governs the deployment of the Force is the Assembly of Heads of State and Government of the CAU. The Assembly may, however, delegate its authority in this respect to a body to be known as the "Defence Council".

(b) DEFENCE COUNCIL

The Defence Council shall-consist of 10 members and shall be elected by the Assembly of Heads of State from among member States on geographical basis for a period of 2 years.

The Defence Council shall have the authority to examine, study and decide upon all matters constituting threat to the defence, peace and security of member States at the request of one or more member States or the Secretary-General of the DAU in consultation with the Chairman of the Defence Council.

The Chairman of the Defence Council shall be elected by the Council from among its members.

(c) COMMITTEE OF CHIEFS OF STAFF

The Committee of Chiefs of Staff shall consist of
the members and shall be elected by the Assembly of
Heads of State from member States. The members of the
Committee shall be elected either from the same countrie
as the Defence Council or from different countries as
the Assembly may decide.

The Committee of Chiefs of Staff shall elect its Chairman.

The Committee shall be responsible to the Defence Council and shall advise the Council on proposals submitted to the Council by the Secretary-General.

- (d) Secretary-General The Secretary-General will be assisted by a Military Advisor whose responsibilities involve:
 - (i) The studying of situations that constitute a threat to peace and security and keep him informed of such situations.

The Secretary—General shall draw the attention of the Defence Council about the prevailing situation for their decision. The Secretary—General shall appoint his Special Representative who will represent him in Political matters in the Field.

(e) DEFENCE ADVISOR

- 1. A Defence Advisor of the rank of a General, shall be appointed by the Assembly of Heads of State on the advice of the Secretary-General,
- 2. He shall serve a term of three years,
- 3. He shall be assisted by a Deputy Defence Advisor of the rank of a Colonel or equivalent and six other staff Officers of field rank from the various services.
- 4. He shall be responsible for the following:
 - (a) Advise the Secretary-General on all matter pertaining to defence and security of Africa,
 - (b) The collation and interpretation of information and intelligence reports pertaining to the liberation of Africa.
 - (c) Assist the Liberation Movements in matters of training.

(f) FORCE COMMANDER

1. He shall be appointed by the Defence Council on the advice of the Secretary-General after consultation with the Committee of Chiefs of Staff.

- 2. He shall be responsible to the Defence Council through the Secretary-General of the MAN,
- 3. He shall be in command of the operational force,
- 4. He shall consult with the political advisor on political aspects of the operation,
- 5. He shall sease to be Force Commander at the end of the operation for which he was appointed.

Roles of OAT Defence Force

- (i) To support member States in the event of aggression from outside the Continent including aggression
 by the racist minority regimes of Southern Africa,
- (ii) To assist in the liberation struggle being waged in the African territories still under colonial.

 and racist domination.
- (iii) To provide peace keeping/observer force in the event of conflict tetween member States.
- (iv) To co-operate with United Nations on matters of defence and security affecting member States.

4. Tasks of the OAU Defence Force

- (i) To provide air, ground; sea and logistic support to member States against foreign aggression by racist minority regimes in Southern Africa,
- (ii) To provide military assistance to the Liberation Movements in the struggle being waged in Southern Africa,
- (iii) To provide Peace Keeping and Observer Forces as directed by the Defence Council,
- (iv) To provide logistic and maintenance support to member States on request through the Defense Council,
- ((v)) To provide engineering to member States on request through the Defence Council.

5. Command and Control

The forces will be provided through the pledges of Member States. Member States will place a contingent of their national armed forces at the disposal of the CAU. This force will be kept in readiness in its own country so that when the Defence Council needs it, the country will be called upon to provide. After this force has been put at the disposal of the CAU it will be under the command of the Force Commander once it enters the theatre of operations.

6. OAU Defence Force Budget and Finance

The Assembly of Heads of State and Government shall establish the budget of the OAU Defence Force on the advice of the Defence Council and the Secretary-General. The budget of the OAU Defence Force shall constitute of:

- (a) The General Defence Fund, and
- (b) The Special Defence Fund

The General Defence Fund

- The General Defence Fund, whose total amount shall be determined by the Defence Council on the recommendation of the Secretary-General shall be approved by the Assembly of Heads of State and Government.
- 2. In the approval of the General Defence Fund, by the Assembly of Heads of State and Government, its total amount shall be raised from OAU member States in accordance with the current scale of assessment.
- Administrative Secretary-General shall operate the General Defence Fund. The Secretary-General, who is the official accountant of the General Defence Fund, shall be answerable to the Defence Council for the administration of the General Defence Fund.

4. The General Defence Fund shall be used for the maintenance of the Defence Council and its organs and to meet the initial logistical requirements of the OAU Defence Force.

The Special Defence Fund

- The Special Defence Fund, whose total amount shall be determined by the Committee of Chiefs of Staff shall be submitted to the Defence Council through the Secretary-General, for its approval.
- The Special Defence Fund shall be established on an ad hoc masis to meet the deployment operational and logistical needs of the OAU Defence Force in a specific situation.
- 7. Under the authority of the Defence Council, the Secretary-General shall operate the Special Defence Fund. The Secretary-General who is the official accountant of the Special Defence Fund, shall be answerable to the Defence Council for the administration of the Special Defence Fund.
- 8. Payment of operational cost to member countries contributing forces, shall be from the Special Defence Fund and shall be determined and approved by the Defence Council on the advice of the Committee of Chiefs of Staff.

9. Both the General and Special Defence Funds shall be audited by the competent auditing organs of the OAU.

7. Conditions of Deployment

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(a) Foreign Aggression

(i) When an OAU member State is subjected to aggression by foreign forces, the Defenes Council should extend all necessary support to strengthen the military capability of the aggressed member State.

(b) Disputes among member States

- (i) All member States should settle their
 disputes by peaceful means in the spirit
 of African brotherhood as well as in.
 compliance with the purposes and principles
 of the OAU Charter.
- (ii) Where the basic purposes and principles of the Charter are violated by member States thereby threatening the peace and security in Africa, the OAU, through its organs, must speak out in defence of the Charter thus defusing tension in the area.

- (iii) The Defence Council shall determine the existence of any threat to peace, breach of peace, or an act of aggression and shall make recommendation, or decide what measures shall be taken to maintain or restore peace and security.
- (iv) The member States are expected to agree and carry out the decisions of the Defence Council to maintain peace and security in the Continent. The deployment of Forces shall be affected upon prior consent of the member States concerned.
- (y). The non-involvement of the Force of Defence in the internal affairs of the States in conflict.
- (vi) The non-inclusion of member States in direct interest in the dispute in the formation of the OAU Defence Force.

8. Objectives of Deployment of the Force

(i) Between two or more member States in dispute with the purposes of separating their troops and ensuring the withdrawal of the parties in conflict to their respective boundaries.




- (ii) In cases of disputes arising out of issues other than boundary disputes, the Peace-keeping Forces, will remain at the Common boundaries of two or more member States in conflict until such time that a political solution is found.
- (iii) In defence of territorial integrity and sovereignty of a member State.

Statute of the AU Defence Force

The Statute of the AU Defence Force shall be a Protocol to the Charter of the OAU and shall be deposited with the Secretariat of the United Nations.
