

He recalled that the First Pan-African Cultural Festival which was held in Algiers, Algeria in 1969, " was a great historic event - both culturally and politically " and reminded the ACC of its responsibility to ensure the continuation of regular Pa.-African Cultural Festivals.

3. In his brief address, the Chairman, Fr. S. Mtiro of Tanzania, emphasised the main points made in the interventions of the Assistant Secretary-General relating to the atrengthening and development of the Pan-African Cultural Festival.

### Agenda Item I (11)

#### Adoption of the Agenda.

- In discussing the adoption of the agenda some interventions were made concerning the election of Oificers. Reference was made to the constitution of the Council which states in Article IV paragraph 3 that: "The Council shall elect a President and Two Vice-Presidents after each election from its momners " which indicates that the office bearers hold office for a period of three years.
- 5. Item 3 of the agenda was amended to read as follows:-

'Natters arising from the report of the Second Ordinary Session of the ACC'. Item 4 of the agenda was amended to have two subitems. The new sub-item was "Financial report of the First
Pan-African Cultural Festival, Algiers, Algeria, 1969". With the
above amendments the agenda was adopted, and this appears hereon
as Appendix II. Due to the absence of the Rapporteur (Liberia),
Uganda was elected by the ACC as a temporary Reporter.

#### Agunda Itam I (111)

#### Organization of work.

6. After some discussion the Council agreed on the following working hours:

Mornings 10 a.m. - 1 p.m. Afternoons 3 p.m. - 8 p.m.

Due to other meetings, the Council noted that it had lest one out of the three days allocated for this meeting, and it therefore agreed to have night sessions when the need arose so as to keep within the previous programme of finishing its work on the 20th December 1972.

#### Agenda Item 2

#### Report of the Alministrative Secretary-General.

- The Assistant Socretary-General made a verbal report under this item. The report was verbal mainly because nothing substantial had happened since the withdrawal of Zaire and since the detates in the OAU organs held in June 1972. In his report, the Assistant Secretary-General indicated that most of what there was to say was covered in his opening speech. For the benefit of the Council, he read extracts from the deliberations of the Council of Ministers made in Rabat, Morocco, in June 1972, which led to the convening of the current session of the ACC, (vide document No. Rpt/Cttee C paragraphs 48 51).
- 8. In discussing the report of the Secretary-General Delegates touched upon the date of hosting the Second Pan-African Cultural 'stival; the reasons for the withdrawal of Zaire as host to the

Festival and the non-receipt of a fresh i vitation, and correspondence between the OAU Secretary it and Members of the ACC. Even though these items were 10. included on the agenda the quistion of correspondence was discussed in detai . The past practices of forwarding correspondence were lined by the Scorotariat as follows: The Secretariat used to send all correspondence to the Ministrias of Foreign/External Affairs and, in most cases the actionministries other than the above, used either not to receive tho communications or they used to receive them late. To avoid this, the Secretariat started to send communications direct to the relevant action-ministries, with copies to the Ministries of Foreign/External Affairs as appropriate. This led to many action rimistries - other than the ministries of Foreign/External Affairs being reasonablly informed of non-political activities of the OAU. Lately however, due to requests by some Member States, the newly introduced practice requires that all communications should be sent through the ministries of Foreign/External Affairs, with appropriat; communications to other action-ministries being enclosed in their own envelopes but all within the envelopes addressed to the Ministrics of Foreign/External Affairs. Where there are embassies at the OW instituting point, the envelopes to ministries of Foreign/internal Affairs of the countries concerned would be given to those imbassies for onward transmission. It is hoped this new method will continue to provide communications from the Secretariat in time to all action-ministries.

9. Some delegations expressed the wish that they should personally receive letters besides the ones that come through official channels but this was not endorsed. After some discussions of these and other matters the Council took note of the verbal report of the Secretary-General.

# Matters arising from the report of the Second Ordinary Sousion of the ACC (Oct. 1970)

10. The Assistant Secretary-General indicated that the report in document ESCYC/77 of the Second Ordinary Session of the aCC, held in Mogadiscio, Somalia, 1970 had been sent to Member States in 1971. After a brief discussion, Nigeria proposed an amendment on Article I of African Films - Rules. The original read:

"Every film (fiction, documentary) ...." and the amended version should now read "Every film (feature, documentary)..." The amendment was accepted by the Council.

#### Agenda Item 4 (1)

# Financial report of the First Pan-African Cultural Festival Algiors, Algeria, 196°.

- 11. The distinguished Leader of the Delegation from Algeria gave a summary financial report please see Appendix III of the First Pan-Africar Cultural Fostival and indicated that this report was sent to the OAU in November 1972. He put the financial expenses into two sections namely operational and equipment corts. The operational costs were iterised under seven major headings. The expenses for equipment were US. 3,242,037 and the operational costs were US\$ 3,792,236, making a total of US\$ 7,034,273. Against this expenditure, he reported the fellowing recoipts: from Algeria, US\$6,624,000, from the OAU, US\$80,000 and from UNESCO US\$29,500.
- 12. The Secretariat indicated that the financial report from Algeria had not yet been recoived and that the OAU subvention was not US\$80,000 as indicated by Algeria but was US\$580,000. It was also pointed out that a break-down of the expenses would be helpful.

African Gultural Festival as presented by Algeria, several delogations felt that the report was not detailed enough. It was felt that a break-down of figures was needed; the report was not conclusive and therefore additional a formation would be rowlined. The Algerian delegation indicated that as this item was not included in the provisional agenda forwarded to members, a detailed report was not prepared. The Algerian delegation presided to send a detailed report to the DAU as soon as possible. With this the Council decided to take note of the report, on the understanding that a more detailed financial report of the First Pan-African Cultural Fertival, will be presented later by Algeria.

### Agonda Itom 4 (11) The Second Pan-Africar Cultural Festival

14. The Council considered several ways of working out a budget for the Second Pan-African Cultural Festival. The Council considered that the experiences of Alg ris and Senegal which had hosted similar festivals and of Nigeria which is about to host a similar festival would be of help in this regard. After a lengthy debate the Council decided to establish a Sus-Committee consisting of the following members:

to prepare a preliminary draft budget for this purpose for its consideration.

#### Fostival Budget for the Second Pan-African Cultural Festival

15. The ACC discussed the draft Festival Pudget as proposed by the sub-committee mentioned above, and after making a few

amendments, i adopted that budget unanimously. The main headings and the funds provided for these were as follows:-

The break-down of those subheadings is contained in Appendix IV attached horsen. The estimated budget of USL1,370,516 would fall on the Pan-African Cultural Festival.

- 16. The host country would provide the infrastructure necessary for the staging of the Pan-African Cultural Fostival, which would inculde: (1) adequate accommodation for participants, invited guests, journalists etc.
  - (ii) 3 or 5 tarostres for performing arts,
  - (iii) 1 or 2 thrustres for drama,
  - (17) I stadium for open air performances,
  - (w) 4 Exhibition Halls,
  - [ (v1) Vehicles of Varying capacities for hire.

Each participating country would among others, pay for:

(1) travel of participants, to and from the Postival City,

- (11) full lodging and boarding of the participants,
- (111) the supply, transportative a d insurance of the equipment to be used by the participants.
- 17. The ACC decided that the above Festival Budget should to presented to the February 1973 Session of the Council of Ministers of the OAU for information only at this juncture. Should the efforts mentioned below fail to raise enough funds to cover that Festival budget, then the OAU will be approached for extra funds to fill the gap at an appropriate time before the 1976 Pan-African Cultural Festival.

#### Raising of funds for the Postivil Budget:

- 18. The ACC discussed at length, the problem of raising furds for the Festival Didget so as to make the Pan-African Cultural Festival self-sufficient as far as funds are concerned. It was noted that at this infant-stage of the Festival, it would be difficult for it to be self-sufficient financially, and therefore the CAU may be called upon at one time or another to assist with some financial grants. With a view to raise funds before the next Cultural Festival, the ACC decided on the following:
- (i) to charge a registration fee for participation in the Cultural Festival of US\$3,000 per State;
- (ii) to recommend to the OAU Member States that once every
  , year, each State should colebrate or hold an "African
  Cultural Mock". During that week, cultural, sport and
  other events, as well as a public campaign for donations,
  would be undertaken from which funds in support of the Pan
  African Cultural Festival, would be collected and forwarded
  to the CAU Secretariat.

(111) to recommend to the OAT Fember States that each
State should voluntarily organize a lottery using
prises denated by well-wishers in that State. The
funds raised from such lotteries would be forwarded
to the OAU Secretariat to support the Pun-African
Cultural Festival. Also, on the subject of
organising lotteries, the OAU Secretariat was requested
to study and report to the next ACC meeting, possibilities
of organizing regularly a continent-wide lottery from
which funds for the Pan-African Cultural Festival would
so collected.

#### Date for the Second Pan-African Cultural Fortival:

- ould now not be hold in 1972 as had been planned. In view of the fact that the "egro Arts Festival is due to be held in Lagos, Nigeria in 1974, the ACC decided that, provided a host country is found, the Second Pan-ifrican Cultural Festival will be held in 1976.

  Arenda Item 5. Completion of the revision of the Rules and Regulations for the Second Pan-African Cultural Festival.
- 21. During the discussion on this item of the Agenda some Members of the ACC re-iterated the fact that some participants and some performing artists had complained about the distribution of prisos in Algiers. Many members indicated that a culture of a given people

cannot easily be judged or compared with others. If judgement is to be passed on cultures, the judges must know every aspect of African cultures which is difficult. Therefore as the traditional music, dance, literature, drama etc. of Africa are products of peoples and not of individuals, the Council decided not to include them in the competitive activities of the Festival. After a long debate the Council decided to revise the events of the Festival, by categorising them as competitive and non-competitive.

- After agreeing on the above Sections, the Council ther 23. made mimor ascuments to the Rules and Regulations of participation to conform with the above events. The amended Rules and Regulations are contained a Appendix V attached.

In discussing the award of prizes, the Council decided that certificates would be awarded to participating groups from Mombor States of the OAU and also to officials requested to assist in the organization of the Pustival.

- 24. The Co noil proceeded to discuss a list of African cultural objects suitable for use as prizes, and after some discussions agreed on the following interim list of items:
- 1. 6. The lyre 11. The stool The spour
- 2. . The phabld 7. The harp 12. The Traditional Carpets
- 1 8. The horn & the lions skin 3. The gorg
- 13. The Kora 4. The mask 9. The xylophone

25. The ACC also decid\_d on the following:

.

- (i) the above list is to be increased by items (togother with their photographs) which the members of the ACC will send to the OAU Secretariat on return to their countries.
- (ii) the ACC will take up again the question of deciding which cultural object will be used as an award for which event.
- (iii) the cultural objects selected as swards, will be reproduced in miniature form in gold, silver and bronze for the purposes of awards in the Cultural Festival.

# Item 6: ANY OTHER BUSINESS

#### Elections of new ACC Members:

- Acc serve for a three-year period and it is further stated in the same Article IV paragraph 4 that after the initial elections, only half of the membership of the ACC would be elected at any one time. The initial elections at which the present 22 Members of the ACC were elected by the OAU as provided for in the ACC constitution, took place in 1969. Therefore, three years being due to expire at the end of 1972, elections of half of the membership of the ACC should take place semetime in 1973.
- The ACC discussed this position, and <u>suggested</u> that since the present Members of the ACC had not yet had an opportunity to organize and stage one of the Pan-African Cultural Festivals as had been anticipated, they should be permitted to continue in service

until they had organized one. If the OAU accepted this suggestion, then this would mean that Article paragraph would remain suspended until the present Nembers of the ACC had organized and staged the Second Pan-African Cultural Festival.

#### ACC's other actions to preserve and develop African Cultures:

28. It was brought to the attention of the ACC that while the staging regularly of Pan-African Cultural Festivals would assist in prosenting African Cultures, the other objectives of preserving and develoring those needed appropriate action. This would among others, entail the carrying out of research and development in Africa's Cultural boritage, and dissominating the results throughout Africa and the world. It was noted that the OAU Seminar on African folklore, music and dance, which was held in Mogadiscio, Som lia in 1970 f document ) proscribed some sotivities which if acted upon, would help in this process. It was observed that lack of ACC funds made it difficult to undertake these and other relevant activities, such as effectively participating in cultural meetings in and outside Africa where African cultural matters are discussed so as to give a true and authoratic position in this regard. Ir order to make a start, the ACC decided to assign to each of its Members to prepare a working paper or any aspect on the preservation and development of African culture, and forward it to the OAU Secretariat for discussion at the next ACC meeting. It was hoped that these working papers would enable the ACC to draw up an inventory of the actions to be undertaken, which would assist in preserving and developing African cultures and would also allow for the allocation of tasks to be done, to various african organs.

29. With the completion of the above items, the ACC came to an end of its agenda. The Chairman and the Assistant Scoretary-General in charge of cultural matters, made closing speechs in which among other things, they thanked the participants, the bifico bearers, the technical staff, the Secretariat and the others connected with the meeting, for their contribution to the success of this Third Ordinary Session of the ACC. The session was formally closed at 8.25 p.m. on the 20th December 1972.

# Subject: Financial Papert of the First Pan-African Cultural Festival.

I have the honour to forward you in reply to your request of 11th August 1972, the financial report on the First Pon-African Cultural Festival.

You will also find hereto attached a copy of the proposed working budget of the cultural fostival. This budget which was exceeded however gives the quasi-totality of the operations carried out during the preparation of the Pestival as well as its execution. This budget was prepared by a National Committee and later submitted to a preparatory committee which met in Algiers with the CAU Secretary-General and representatives of certain Member States.

It should further be specified that it was carried out by a Steering Committee which was composed of five Member States - Guinea, Mali, Senegal, Tanzania and Algeria.
